

I know this seems like a small point but learning to adjust to a campus during your freshman year is very important and being in a place that isn't too intimidating is vital

These opinions are coming from a biology major who is going to medical school now. My experiences are biased toward the sciences.

The Good:

- 1. I was a biology major, as were a lot of other people my freshman year. Because it is a resarch university there are a lot of research opportunities on campus or the medical center which is 10 miles away in the city of Orange.
- 2. There are a lot of pretty good professors because they are attracted to UCI for various reasons. All of your professors will be accomplished researchers. Most like to teach but there are a few who really don't like it, but that's the case at any university.
- 3. The students are generally friendly and there are a lot of clubs, IM sports, and other activities to get involved with fairly easily.
- 4. The tuition is really cheap if you are instate. I think it's less then 7,000 a year for a school ranked in the top 50 schools nationwide. UCI is a really young school (40 years old) and is slowly making a better name for itself as time passes. In such a short time it has made considerable gains in terms of prestige.
- 5. Irvine is a really safe place. I would be out at like 3am at times, and never felt in danger at all. Just a calm safe city which can be important for many people.
- 6. The school is only 5 minutes from the beach. Also, the weather is fantastic all year around.
- 7. The ARC. It is the school gym and is really really nice. One of the best gyms I've seen ever, and this includes those fancy fitness clubs.

The bad:

- 1. If you are pre med, expect some major competition especially if you are a biology major. The first year biology courses are essentially weed out courses. My first biology class ever at UCI, had 4 different lectures, each filled to the max with almost 400 students. By the time senior year rolled around the number of biology majors was considerably less.
- 2. If you want to get around you need a car. Grocery stores and stuff like that are within walking distance though.
- 3. If you are pre med, the schools biology counseling office isn't the greatest in terms of helping you out or providing guidance. You'll have to scramble on your own.
- 4. A lot of your classes during the first 3 years will be in auditoriums with 300 students. I tend to like bigger classes but it can be tough to get to know your professors. But if you go to office hours and make yourself known, it shouldn't be a problem.
- 5. School spirit is lacking. I'm guilty of this. No football team since we have too small of a student population. Our basketball team is below average. I think we are good in volleyball and water polo but who really cares about those sports. Also, the school is a bit of a commuter school, so the campus is pretty quiet on the weekends.
- 6. I felt our biology curriculum was a bit too intense. I have heard first hand that the biology major in UCI is much more intense then the one at UCLA or UCSD. I haven't been to those schools but this is jsut what I have heard.

© Electrical Engineering (Alumni) - Male I was an electrical engineering student at UC Irvine, and if you have any thoughts about going there for the ECE department (now known as the CS department), you're better off going to a school like Cal Poly. UC Irvine prides itself on the teaching philosophy of "teaching students how to think." That may be fine for the sociology department in which the education is mostly analytical, but it simply doesn't work for technical majors. The courses focus way too much on theoretical concepts and the professors do a lousy job "teaching."

Since UCI is a research institution, a good number of the professors do research and as a result, they can be half – assed about actually teaching.

The teaching assistants are nearly all foreign and their communications skills are inadequate.

The academic counselors are useless. They're all arrogant women, none of whom have engineering degrees, and one of whom is verbally abusive (yes Robin Alward, I'm talking about you).

The worst part of UCI engineering department, like I said before, is the focus on theory. When I graduated from college and interviewed for jobs, interviewers only cared about what projects I had worked on, aka hands - on stuff. Electrical Engineering - Male

Similar to the previous post about the school's EE program, I agree with the student's comments.

In the EE/CE (now EECS) dept, almost all faculty and TAs are foreigners. I had 2 teachers that spoke understandable english. Some of the labs and projects you will be ill – prepared for. Many of the students do not pay attention or strive to work hard. There is constant cheating and study groups are more like midterm question anticipation sessions.

The EE curriculum (that I went through) had only 1 programming class. The school did not teach us VHDL/Verilog, nor did we extensively use Matlab or Cadence. What really helped me was doing extra projects on my own (all classes have online websites, so if you browse through the previous year's courses you can get a feel of projects you should be able to do).

My sociology and urban planning professors were 10x more friendly and approachable than the EE professors.

Career placement is extremely difficult, and the companies attracted to the school were minimal since it isn't a very reputable school in the tech industry. Sad how even Broadcom doesn't have a booth and their HQ is in Irvine. Of course I was attending during the tech recession, but to have a "career fair" where almost no companies are accepting resumes and merely have booths just to tell you to apply online is not very encouraging.

UCI is a good school. Their School of Humanities offers great classes and helpful, accessible faculty. I can't speak for the other departments, but I have heard some horror stories from Biology majors. The social scene is hit and miss. You have to find your niche on campus, whether it be clubs or greek life. The school, however isn't totally lacking in social interaction.

• Fine Arts Painting/Sculpture/Photography/etc Female

College is what you make of it. UCI, although it is not a great school, it is not a horrible school. The social aspect is so – so, as you have to look for something to

do for fun, since south orange county is a boring place. It's a decent school though, depending on your major. I have many friends in the sciences and humanities, and I hear that those are UCI's strengths. However, I cannot say the same for the Studio Art department. Although there are very few instructors who are helpful or approachable, I would have to say that for the most part, a majority of the faculty are self – absorbed, cocky, arrogant, and only into their own work. The students in my department also lack the drive and creativity, thus resulting in low competition. think the faculty and the environment has something to do with this because they're not very encouraging and this can be seen during critiques. The instructors do not push the students by being too nice and not encouraging the students to speak, resulting in SILENT critiques. Seriously, nobody speaks and i have a feeling that many students wait last minute to finish a project because so many things look so half – assed. In fact, I find myself to be the only one taking advantage of using the art studios for my homework. I'll be in there from 4pm - 11pm daily and i'm the ONLY ONE in there working. What i found very disappointing is the fact that i would be in my intermediate drawing class, look at the person next to me to see that this idiot can't even draw a box in correct 2 point perspective. How the heck did he/she pass basic drawing? This is what i'm talking about. Also with the digital arts minor, the program is also very weak. It takes like 3 weeks to teach very basic skills in photoshop or illustrator and the instructors are self absorbed and unapproachable as well. I became a studio art major because I am pursuing an art/design career and i was hoping that taking studio art courses would help me build a foundation, but unfortunately that's not the case. Although I did learn how to read art conceptually and I did find my upper division drawing and painting classes enjoyable and helpful, i cannot say the same for everything else. Most of the classes i took in my major are just BS filler classes that have no importance to life whatsoever. I had to take classes at community colleges to take relevant courses. If you are pursuing an art or design career, my advice to you is not to go to UCI. Go to a real art school, like Cal Arts, ARt Center, San francisco ARt institute, Rhode Island School of Design, California college of the arts, Otis, or any other properly accredited art college.

Your college experience is what you make of it. In the end, it's your decisions that matter, not your teachers'. Nobody is going to hold your hand. As a college student, you're on your way to being a responsible adult, so it's time to make your own decisions. If you plan to succeed in life, it's your work ethic and decision making that matters most, not the school that you go to. UC Irvine is an excellent school if you are pursuing a degree in the sciences or liberal arts. However, for fine arts, look elsewhere. The Studio ARt department is a joke and the faculty don't care about you.

I would have to admit that UCI wasn't exactly my first choice for a college. It had come down to four schools - UCI, UCSD, and Pepperdine. Even though they're all by the beach, UCSB had an ugly campus with some buildings in or near the English department that looked like they were about to fall apart. They put you through a rigorous year - long Humanities Core Course, which you'll hate as you're doing the many required readings, but at the end of the year you'll be thankful because the smaller discussion sections have awesome teachers (yes, even the TAs) who are always willing to help. The Literary Journalism is a new major at UCI, and the cool thing about it is that the director of the major went to Columbia, won the Pulitzer Prize, AND actually left his editorial position at the L.A. Times to get the program going. Although the LJ department is growing, it's far from being impersonal – it's not impossible to get to know the director. Plus they have teachers who actually know what they're talking about. The Humanities school is understandably underrated, given that UCI is known for the sciences, but if you're one of those people looking only at small – liberal arts colleges, you should definitely consider UCI because the Humanities program is ranked as one of the best in the nation.

It's been almost eight years since I graduated from UC Irvine with a B.A. in Sociology. I must say that my four years at UC Irvine were filled with fond and not so fond memories.

For those of you who are seriously thinking about going to Irvine for your higher education. Let me give you both the Pros and Cons of going there.

PROS:

- For those of you who prefer going to small school, Irvine is definitely for you. Compared to my graduate studies at U of Washington (Seattle), with over 35,000 students, Irvine was relatively small. You won't feel like a small fish in a big pond.
- If you are an Asian American and you want to be in tune with your Asian/Asian

American culture/identity, this is the place for you. From what I heard, Irvine is one of the few schools where Asian American student population is the majority (52%). Situated in Orange County (not too far from Los Angeles), Chinese, Korean, Japanese, Vietnamese, Filipino are not the minority here. It is pretty diverse here, and you won't feel out of place whether you are a liberal, conservative, Christian, gay/lesbian, White, Asian, Hispanic, African American, etc.

- The dorms, from what I remember, were fairly nice, compared to my graduate school (U of Washington). The food is edible, but if you get sick of dorm food (like most students do), then there are restaurants (especially Asian) nearby.
- The best majors seem to be: Biology, Psychology (sort of), East Asian Languages & Literature (Chinese & Japanese), Computer Sciences, and Humanities (My regret is not taking more courses in Humanities which would have improved my writing style.).
- The campus is easy to get around, and the study rooms are open all night.

CONS:

- If you don't have a car (like I did during my college years), you are pretty much stuck in the campus area. If you don't plan to bring a car, then be sure to make friends who have cars.
- Academically, it was not all that challenging, with the exception of Biology or other sciences. Social Science seems like a cake walk, compared to Biology.
- If you are a Biology major planning to go to med school, then you are not alone. You will definitely be challenged, and many of my friends who were science majors switched to "easier" majors (ex. Economics, Social Sciences, etc.).
- Most of the lower division courses are taught by TAs, some of them (especially in the Math and Science department) are taught by grad students from foreign countries with limited English ability (I guess this applies to many schools.).

ADVICE:

- Don't expect to get high marks during your first year. It takes a while to get adjusted to new environment. If you don't start off well, then don't let that discourage you. Once you get used to the system, you should improve in no time.
- If you are a "slacker" or "unmotivated," then Biology (or other sciences) may not be the best major for you. My roommate during his freshman year started off with a D average, and he dropped out during the second year.
- Take as many courses that involve a lot of writing (from the Humanities department), even if you hate writing. Whether you are a Bio major, computer sciences, fine arts, OR English literature, writing classes will DEF-INITELY come in handy, especially if you plan to pursue a graduate/professional degree.
